From Fr Cirilo

Dear Parishioners, Peace!

God opens doors. We have this image of a father, a saviour whose activity could be captured in opening doors. We can see this in the first reading from the book of prophet Isaiah — a vision of how God works. And it is addressed primarily to Israel — the chosen



people. Imagine us as part of the chosen people, separate from the rest. We occupy the special spot, a spot that cannot be replaced. And it cannot be reached by anyone else. We are God's own and that is only for us. Well it is true. Israel is elected by God.

Yet, it is also God's intention that doors be opened to other nations. Isaiah is reminding the chosen people that they are not the only ones to whom God opens doors. God, likewise wants to open doors towards salvation, eternal life and relationships with him to other nations. It must have been a shock to Israel who had exclusive claim to God's favour. God opens the door to all the nations. In fact, God through the prophet Isaiah, even said that, through this people from different nations, with different languages — meaning outsiders who do not belong to the chosen ones, the inner group.

From the outsiders, from the fugitives, God will send missionaries to other nations. So that they could invite others to God, to Jerusalem, to Mount Zion, to the holy city. So the holy city of God would not only be holy for Israel, but for all. Jerusalem's doors will be opened to all the nations. They will bring offerings the way Israel brings offerings to God. So all the other nations can bring offerings to God and maybe they would even invite the Israelites. The "outsiders" will invite the Israelites to "come home" to God. So from the outsiders, there might be someone chosen by God.

I am always amazed by the gifts and talents of the community of Wellington South, such diversity is so enriching. There is a danger in labelling one as an outsider, because there is no such thing. In so doing we lose the chance to be God's missionaries and lose the chance to open and hold the door to God.

St Mary of the Angels is already a sacred place and has been for one hundred years. Last Sunday it took on new meaning as our National Shrine, and it is wonderful! There is a



theory that we do not create or make our own sacred places. The holy place, the holy ground chooses itself rather than being created by us — in other words it is the grace of God at work. One religious historian in reflecting on this idea wrote, "in actual fact, the place is never chosen by men and women, it is merely discovered by them." Somehow the sacred place reveals itself to us. St Mary of the Angels, our National Shrine of Mary the Mother of God Assumed into Heaven is here, ready to be discovered by everyone. On the Feast of the Assumption we gave thanks that Mary's bodily Assumption into heaven makes clear to us that there is room for our humanity in heaven too.
