From Fr Michael

The greatest thing you'll ever learn is just to love and be loved in return. In our better moments we all recognise that loving and being loved are at the heart of being human; at the heart of our true well-being and deep flourishing; at the heart of being Christian. Today's gospel takes that teaching a step further. Not only are we to love our neighbours as ourselves, we are to love even our enemies, those who persecute us.

Some teachings of Jesus can seem at the same time to be both impossible and exactly what we need to hear. Loving one's enemies is a good illustration. Imagine this same Gospel being read today by congregations in the Ukraine. In that setting, one could be tempted to bracket or suspend the teaching when life itself is at stake. Even though we live at a safe distance, it is easy even for us to feel great anger towards those responsible for situations of unprovoked aggression and the untold hurt which will last for decades. And yet, to respond in the same way would be to put ourselves on the same level as the aggressor. The Christian hope is to break the cycle of violence by not engaging in the same way.

This certainly does not mean that people under threat cannot defend themselves and their families. From other passages in the Gospels it is clear that Jesus is not telling us to ignore injustices and never make a stand against others. He is simply telling us not to become people of hate ourselves. Otherwise, how are we different?

The good news is: God loves you. The bad news is: He loves everyone else just as much. It is clear that for Jesus, the love of God and love of neighbour are at the centre of our being human before God.

The call to conversion is a call to give, to pass on, just as we have received. We are loved and so should love; we are forgiven and so should forgive; we are consoled and so should console. Why is that? Because the love, forgiveness, consolation and whatever else we receive only really impacts me and becomes truly "me" when I pass it on. Only then have I experienced the message of the prophet: "I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh" (Ezek 36:26).

Because the truth of God is love, conversion to God is conversion to love. This is the Christian ideal, stretching us to a goodness and a love beyond the natural. This is only possible when we allow ourselves to be loved by God. Jesus tells us that acting out of love is better than acting out of revenge. What does your experience tell you?

What lessons have you learned in life on when and how to make a stand? What wisdom would you share with others from your experience?


